Commonalities in library and SW professions

- Emerged in the 1800s
- Female-dominated frontline workers
- Male-dominated leadership
- 1850's
 - Hull House founded
 - Melvil Dewey founded American Library Association
 - Columbia College 1st library degree
 - The Library Journal was launched

Shared values by both SWs and librarians

- Commitment to creating services accessible to all
- Emphasis on promoting the public good
- Prioritize community health and well-being
- Committed to individual rights such as autonomy, self-determination, privacy, and confidentiality

Shared Ethics by SW's and Librarians

- Service
- Privacy and Confidentiality
- Access to Information
- Respect for Rights
- Professional Skills
- Integrity
- Social Justice

Library SW presents many unique opportunities

- Provide services in a free, accessible space
- Lack of stigma associated with entering a library
- Services provided regardless of age, gender, race. citizenship, income, insurance coverage, etc.
- Ability to develop programs to meet community needs
- Policies and practices can be examined through a social iustice lens
- Brings awareness of issues such as MH and trauma to government agency

Challenges within library SW

- Some ethical/values conflicts do arise (e.g. documentation)
 - Documenting system that includes the requirements for both the library and social work needs
- Potential for reducing librarians' role in addressing community needs (e.g. "the SW will handle that.")
- Community need may exceed SW capacity
- Working in a non-SW setting can raise challenging questions in areas that don't have standardized protocols/answers



Where are we now and future directions for library SW


- The first full time library SW was hired in San Francisco in
- Increasingly, libraries are tailoring their SW services to the needs of their specific communities
- As of 2023, there are 300 library SWK partnerships, and this is a growing trend
 - Whole Person Librarianship


Librarians were increasingly seeing issues beyond their expertise

- Patrons facing housing insecurity and/or homelessness
- Unaccompanied minors
- Elderly patrons seeking technology assistance but also:
- Trying to access public benefits
- Increasing isolation
- In need of social services









Initial services offered by MSW intern

- Intakes for patrons looking to access services
- Office hours for SW services
- Beginning development of community partnerships to facilitate patron referrals
- Introduction of SW model to library team



First Carthage BSW intern began in 2020-21 academic year

- Due to the pandemic, the library was closed for the entire year
- Intern focused on laying more groundwork for the SW line of service
 - Research and development activities aimed at developing a sensory room
 - Training library staff on trauma-informed practices
 - Research and data collection in areas of social justice practice in libraries

Several other changes at RPL

- Change in leadership
- Retirement of full-time librarian
- A decision was made to transition that FTE into a full time SW position



Carthage faculty's support of this new role

- Ongoing consultation
 - Assistance in developing the job description
 - Served on interview panel
 - Discussions of scope of practice, ethical mandates, etc.
 - A Carthage SW faculty member joined the RPL board
 - Hired Ashley Cedeno in September, 2021 (Carthage BSW alum)
 - Provide weekly supervision

Other areas of continued collaboration and growth...

- Continuation of field partnership
- Partner on RPL staff trainings
- Assistance with networking efforts to support library SW effectiveness
- Development of new partnership between Kenosha Public Library and Carthage College
- Growth of RPL internship program to potentially host students from other BSW/MSW programs
- Intro of SW internship at KPL

RACINE

- · Patron Interactions (appointments, walk ins or phone calls that resulted in a referral to a community resource or direct assistance)
 - Since September 2021, RPL's Library Social Worker has had a total of 1,577 Patron Interactions
 - 2021 (4 months)- 55 (13.75 average)
 - 2022- 449 (37.4 monthly average) 2023- 1,073 (119 monthly average)
 - *Tracked up until end of September 2023
- Bus Pass Program
 - Free bus passes for social service needs, started in September 2022

 951 bus passes have been distributed

 - Driver's license clinic and other legal support; have monthly pop-up clini


Macro



- Social Worker a part of Leadership Team
- · Rules of Behavior Policy
 - o Stressing that "different," behavior is not necessarily dangerous behavior
 - o Regular review of policies with social justice lens
 - o Emphasis on bias trainings and Trauma-Informed Care
- Banning Procedures
 - · Who is affected most by these procedures?
 - o Often, those that are banned are those that need services the most, so how to mitigate that?
